DIFFERENT PARTS, SAME BODY

"In Christ we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given us." (Romans 12:5-6)

Reunions are always amusing. The mental snapshot you took 25 years ago bears a fuzzy resemblance to the balding, pot-bellied guy standing in front of you. When the shock wears off and you get talking about the old times, it's like you haven't missed a day. I and half a dozen of my Seminary classmates were delegates at the 61st Convention of the Wisconsin Synod this summer. It's been almost two decades since we were (wisely) scattered across the United States. The regional differences among us were evident in our haircuts, sports fan apparel, and perspectives on ministry. But whether the congregations we serve are large and traditional, or small and cutting-edge, all of the delegates were united in faith and in purpose.



Not even a three-hour long debate over a new translation of the Bible could shatter our accord. We celebrated our unity with maturing Lutheran church bodies in Puerto Rico, Nigeria and Ukraine, as well as our brothers who are tilling tough soil in this country. We rejoiced at the increasing number of students who are joining the ranks at our church's worker training schools. We recommitted ourselves to fulfilling our church body's motto, "Christ's Love, Our Calling" as we approved a ministry budget plan of \$125 M over the next two years.

What we can't do as a congregation by ourselves, the 1,287 congregations of our Synod can accomplish united in God's grace. Likewise, what we can't do as individual Christians, we can accomplish as members of Lamb of God Lutheran Church united in the body of Christ. We thank God for our unity of beliefs, which we proclaim every time we distribute the Lord's Supper to our Confirmed members only. We thank God for our unity of purpose, as we have committed ourselves to fund our own ministry budget plan of \$169,749, and to send \$12,600 of that as an offering to our Synod.

And now we have the opportunity to strengthen our unity even further, as we develop and promote Small Group ministry in our congregation over the next twelve months. Is there any doubt that these small groups will foster closer relationships among our members? Is there any question that our mutual trust will grow as we carry each others' burdens in love? Would anyone deny that small groups are critical to helping newcomers fit in to our congregation? And has anyone failed to notice that participating in a small group requires some sacrifices?

There are approximately 100 trillion (10^{14}) cells in the human body. Each cell is remarkably designed to function in harmony with other cells. Grouped together into tissues, organs and sys-



tems, the united cells of the human body can compose symphonies, send men and women into outer space, and pass on the collective wisdom of humanity. When we are united in small groups, congregations and a Synod, God will use us to pass on the treasures of His Word to our children, and to our world. Because of our old selfish nature, there are no magic wand solutions to our natural tendency towards discord and disharmony. But because Christ united himself with our hu-

manity, and our punishment, we are all reconciled to God, and we can be reconciled to each other.

AN OPEN LETTER TO ALL TORNADO RELIEF WORKERS FROM THE LAMB OF GOD CONGREGATION

Dear Christian Aid & Relief Workers, Pastor Warnecke and Mark Vance,

What a difference you all have made here in Alabama! You've touched so many lives and made them us feel better again. God bless you all for taking precious time from your lives to come to the hot and dusty tornado ravaged counties of Alabama and help put things back together again. The progress to date is nothing short of a miracle, though there will be plenty of recovery work for a long time yet.

It has been determined that 61 tornadoes have officially affected Alabama during the outbreak of April 27th, 2011 causing a total of 241 fatalities. It is easy to see how these numbers can affect the people of our state. Even if a tornado didn't hit your own property, the damage was so widespread that a person inevitably knew someone who was affected, or someone not far from your residence died. But in spite of the pain (or perhaps because of it), we have prayed to God for help, and we all got out there and started working.

And then the calls started coming in, followed by mail with donations, and e-mails asking "How can we help you?"

Mark Vance Director of Operations of WELS Christian Aid and Relief called here soon after the fateful day and asked how things were at the Lamb of God congregation. Did we need any help? He offered prayers, people with chain saws, money from the relief account and a great big trailer full of tools. Soon after, folks started arriving, Steve Zambo, Bill Diersen, Dave Bunnow, Neil & Darlene Fittje, Nicole Bull, with Laurel, Ethan, and Bethany, and Debbie Maggio. Some came for a day, some for a week. I wish I had all the names from Columbia 's Christ Our Savior, but on Saturday, there were nearly 40 people total with all the volunteers from our church and yours for lunch on Saturday afternoon that week. Here are the names from Columbia we know about - Ciaranja White, Kyla White, Bob Davis, Kim Davis, Wes Schappert, Michelle Schappert, Shelby Young, Abby Young, Samantha Young, also Mr. Young, as well as Dan Gensmer and Josh Gensmer. It was 95-98 degrees all week and no one complained. You all just kept on cutting trees, hauling debris to the curbside, and tearing apart those broken homes, making way for a new life to begin. The rest of us, cooked meals, made sandwiches, brought in water and juices, while others were sharpening tools, driving front loaders and bulldozers.

One man who was helped during that first week broke down and cried at all the generosity of spirit and labor. He had lost his wife the month before, and then the tornado took his house. He had nothing left. Many of the volunteers hugged him and helped him pick up the pieces of his life.

Pastor Richard Warnecke of Christ Lutheran in Pewaukee, WI called soon after the Mark Vance crew left, and said "We're coming to help." He knew the need was there, and just simply made the arrangements. Before we knew it, we had another crew. Bob Sandlass, Dave Bunnow, & Mike Luetke, came with Pastor Warnecke, and father-son pairs came from Maitland, FL, Kevin and Kyle Zastro, Rufus and Derek Hall, Michael and Daniel Golish, and Richard and Jason Leutzow. And along with them more wonderful folks came from Columbia's Christ Our Savior. By that time, we at Lamb of God were getting a bit more organized. We had signs to put up where we were working that showed Lamb of God Church was helping here. We passed out Lamb of God T-Shirts for some of the workers to wear. And the people were noticing. Many of those affected by the tornados came by with food and drinks. Many were thanking the workers for the help. Some were coming by and asking if they could also get some help. And we always prayed together.

One lady, Melinda Lyles, had not received any assistance in the 6-7 weeks since the tornado, even her church was destroyed. She felt helpless and distraught. On the last day of Pastor Warnecke's trip, and with some of Lamb of God's congregation volunteers later, a lot of the trees were taken care of and the debris was set to the side of the road for the Army Corps of Engineers to remove to the giant burn pile developing in the outreaches of the county. This example of Christian love in action encouraged Melinda to believe that her life will be okay once again.

Previously strangers to Alabama, now best friends forever to us are Karen Brazie and Mitz Wagner. These two girlfriends filled over a 1/3 of a tractor trailer truck with items they purchased and received as a donation from their own church, St. Paul's, in North Fond Du Lac, WI where Pastor Thomas Behnke helped them organize. Nearby St. Peter's Church in El Dorado, WI donated money. Kaye McFarlen here in Athens, who is United Way's in-charge person for Limestone County's recovery, talked with Mark Vance when he visited with her to find out the best ways WELS Christian Aid and Relief could be of service. Kaye told Mark that Karen Brazie drove into the newly established relief warehouse with the best mixture of extremely helpful donations she had ever seen – she called it a "blessing undisguised." Karen drove a truck from Ecklund Logistics, with permission of her employers Lana and her son Kurt Ecklund, **CONTINUED ON PAGE 6**

A new school year is almost upon us at our Pre-school. We, the pre-school board have been hard at work in preparation of this coming year. Once again we find our anticipated enrollment to be hovering around the 20 student figure. With an enrollment of over 20, we will have a staff of 4. Our Director/teacher is still Elsa Toepke; Deborah Bray is our second teacher. Our aides will be Beth Dressler and Robin Lockwood with the possibility of Gabi Presley on some days. We have a Tuesday/Thursday class for three year olds and a Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday class for four year olds. We foresee much more interaction between the classes this year.

The mother had to bring the sister to see the pre-school and has enrolled her as well. She had not planned on the three year old attending. Word of mouth does work!



Notes from the Scriptorium

Summer is a quiet time for your Church Council, but the season is soon coming to an end. That means the busy season of school and holidays will be kicking in soon. So what has your Council been doing on their summer vacation?

Once the budget was passed at the Congregational Meeting June 26, we set to work ensuring that the budget—and the mission plan that guides it—is executed. Jon Ehrman led a tennis clinic for nearly 30 of our neighbors in the Madison area. That equipment is now in storage and can be used again!

Jon also has been busy working on our community surveys to learn what our neighbors' greatest needs are. These surveys, in combination with Gary Anthony's Long Range Planning Committee, will help Lamb of God take a good, clear-eyed look at the future and determine where we can best apply our collective gifts in the future.

In connection with the Long-Term Planning Committee, your fearless Council Secretary (and acting Inreach Chairman) worked with Gary and Del Brooks, and Cindy Curtis on some future planning for Little Lambs Learning Center. Much as we value Elsa's continued fine work as Director for Little Lambs, she won't be doing that forever. Given that, what happens next? Do we hire a new Director? Do we need a Director in the future, or should we try something else? I don't have all those answers, to be sure, but with inputs from Del and Cindy I was able to at least provide some insight into what the alternatives might be, and their likely consequences. Attending the meeting was Karla Poehlman (briefly), Nancy Roebke, Joe Reis, Gabi Presley, and myself. We had a wonderful exchange of ideas and all agreed that we needed to do something new and different from previous years.

Based on our discussions, we came up with a dozen possible themes and now need to narrow down the list and find corresponding crafts to engage visiting children for five minutes or less; while we talk to their parents and distribute literature on our Church's programs and activities. We plan to meet again after our weekly church service on Sunday, August 21, 2011.

To support the Church's booth, we will need help and support of at least 24 members! Please be on the lookout for a signup sheet on the table in the Narthex in the next few weeks to volunteer to help. Help will be required to haul tables and chairs from the Church and setup the booth starting at 8:00 AM, staff the booth at two hour intervals and tear down the booth after 4:00 PM. Someone willing to provide a truck for hauling tables and chairs the day of the festival would be most appreciated.

"Different Gifts, Same Grace" Comes to Lamb of God



The new WELS theme, "Christ's Love, Our Calling," is also being used in congregations across our synod as part of a four-year stewardship emphasis. This, the second year's focus, is titled *Different Gifts, Same Grace*. Your church's leaders are convinced you will appreciate this series!

The word "stewardship" usually brings to mind encouragement to be more intentional with how we use our worldly wealth. However, there are other important aspects of stewardship as well. This year our primary focus will be on talents. We all have different gifts, but share in the same grace of Jesus Christ!

Consider the following:

- 1) If God's people aren't regularly using their talents at worship, should it really be called worship?
- 2) If we don't invest our talents in raising our children and serving our neighbor, what will soon happen with our society?
- 3) If we aren't interested in using our talents to promote the preaching and teaching of Christ in our midst—and around the world—what will soon happen to mission work?

The point? God has blessed each member of his body, the church, with certain talents. When each member uses those talents to serve God and each other, the body thrives. If members leave their talents untapped, the body suffers.

Different Gifts, Same Grace will use Romans 12:6-8 as the biblical framework for the series, which includes discussions about the gifts of SERVING, ENCOURAGING, GENEROSITY, and LEADERSHIP. Here at Lamb of God we will dedicate 4 weeks this fall to the emphasis beginning on September 4. Members who regularly attend Sunday School will be happy to know that a companion Bible study will be presented during these weeks as well.

We'll see you in church on September 4. Until then, know for certain that the Lord of the church has richly blessed every member of our congregation with gifts and abilities to be used to God's glory and our neighbor's good: "We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully" (Romans 12:6-8).
