RECOVERING MISSIONARIES

*"The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not overcome it."
(John 1:5)*

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

My name is John and I'm a recovering missionary. It's been eight years and 18 days since I came back to the USA. For the first six months, foreign language films played in my head (without subtitles) while I slept. Once I let a non-English word slip out during an English sermon. Most days go by now without a single foreign word appearing on my mental teleprompter, although occasionally I struggle to find the English word for something I know better as скала or крепост.

I dove deeply into my host culture and language. Blame it on youthful idealism, or brainwashing at missionary orientation. One of the highest compliments I received was from one of our volunteers who said when he first met me, he thought I was Bulgarian. When you're that far gone, the decompression is painful.

I've tried to shovel dirt over those ten years of memories, but the language circuits are still wired in my brain. Anything from Eastern Europe reactivates them. Because the men who delivered our new mattress were from Ukraine, Slavic words will be on my tongue for the rest of the day and maybe tonight, too. My heart will ache for the brothers and sisters I left behind, and for those who have abandoned ship since.

I'm not alone in my pain – other recovering missionaries have shared their sad stories with me in a corner of the noisy room. No missionary counts down the days until returning "home," but the exit is almost always messy. Reverse culture shock is as real and intense as anything soldiers returning from the battlefield face.

Have I ever regretted agreeing to let them send me six thousand miles from the land of my birth? Never. God works for good in all things, even in my weaknesses and my blunders. Why would God be so good to me, if not for the One who was sent on The Mission. "You are my servant, Israel, in whom I will display my splendor... I will make you a light for the Gentiles, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth." (Isa. 49:3,6) Because Jesus fulfilled God's mission of mercy, God has shown mercy to me, a prideful sinner. That's why he's let me proclaim his mercy to other sinners on both sides of the Atlantic for 18 years.

That's why he showed mercy to a terrified German monk nearly 500 years ago, and to those who took his teachings and his last name. And that's why he has let you in on the secret, too. That's why he's let our congregation proclaim the Gospel in Madison for the last 9.5 years. And that's why God lets our church body, the Wisconsin Synod, continue to train and send missionaries all over the world, in Eastern Europe, and Malawi and Kansas City, to name a few places.

On November 27th we will have opportunity to respond to God's mercy by giving a special offering to our Synod, to support the schools that prepare future missionaries here and abroad. On that day, just like every other day of your life, I pray you will join me in admitting, "I am a recovering missionary too!"



On October 22nd a survival lesson titled "Lost in the Woods" was given to the parents and children of LLLC, M.O.M., and people from our church and neighborhood by the North Alabama Search Dog Association and it was very well attended. Elsa Toepke wrote this article to correspond with the survival lesson and Pastor Roebke offers a class to reach out to those who are "lost in life"

Alone, tired and frightened Jordan finally cried herself into a restless sleep in the little spot she'd created for herself, scared that no one would come to find her. She was sorry she'd turned her back on her father and stubbornly walked the other way when she didn't get her way about which path to take. "Maybe they're glad I'm gone," she thought. "Camping and hiking were supposed to be fun, but it sure isn't turning out that way and now I'm really lost." On and on, her mind played the blame game.

In her dreamlike half-sleep she thought she heard her name being called, finally waking enough to realize it wasn't a dream; she looked to see her brother's hand reaching down to pull her into a hug telling her "I'm so glad I found you, you're safe now. Let's go home. Dad's waiting." Tears of fear and anxiety dissolved into tears of joy and relief; filling her with a feeling of security.

The thought of anyone, especially a child alone and lost in the woods is a scary thought. We're thankful for those who are involved in search and rescue. In many ways our story mirrors that of the fictional Jordan above.

Naturally and purposely, we turned our back on God, the heavenly Father who created us, to have a loving relationship with him. We stubbornly and persistently insisted on having our own way and walked the other way! Unresolved feelings such as restlessness or guilt, an undefined sense of longing and loneliness; even anger and fear may well be the result.

Many years ago, another Father sent his Son, Jesus, on the ultimate search and rescue mission for us. It was his purpose to seek us out and restore the broken relationship with the father.

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Our Lutheran Women's Missionary Society Southern Hills Circuit Holds Fall Rally in Tennessee

The regional branch of the society which supports WELS missions met on October 15 this year in Memphis, TN. Sue Povenelli, my daughter, Lily, and I attended and represented Lamb of God. We travelled Friday the four hours over to one of Tennessee's Music Cities and arrived at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church after 7:00 pm. Members of the church invited us to eat, but we had stopped in Corinth, MS to enjoy a meal at Sonics. But we did take time to "meet and greet" others. Also, I set up my table to highlight the WELS Multi-Language Publications program and our family's mission and translation experiences in Bulgaria. Other displays were in process of being set up to highlight the 30-year, 60-conference history of our circuit.

We got directions to our host family where we crashed before the next day's busy rally schedule. Thankfully we had a GPS to direct us through the darkness and ignorance. Despite this, we still had several wrong turns including a "Huff and Puff" street. But we were thankful to not be trapped on I-40 in the other direction; traffic looked backed up.

The next morning, our hosts from Gloria Dei, Mike and Gayle and family prepared strong coffee. The church would provide our breakfast. We enjoyed hearing about their love for Alabama football. The son even had a crimson body and face suit in honor of the Tide. By 7:30, we knew we had to leave for the church. We wanted some cushion time; we did not want to get lost too badly because I still wasn't sure how the day's PowerPoint would work out. By 8:30 after getting gas and getting just a little lost, we arrived to a good situation with the media to support my presentation. After knowing that, some super homemade cinnamon rolls tasted really great. At registration we received a blue folder that we were to share with our home church. This and the cookbook/memory book include the historical highlights as well as recipes submitted by current women participants in our circuit's churches, such as Joni Gruber.

You can view conference materials on our special LWMS display table through November. We are part of this! Check it out!

Pastor Kober of the host church led our opening devotion which reinforced the theme of the 30th Anniversary: "Thus far has the Lord helped us." This comes from the story of Samuel setting up a stone to commemorate the goodness of God. We then launched into the business meeting part of the day. The roll call included us standing up when each of our churches were called. It seemed we had many women and men from all over the South Atlantic area. We discussed Befriend-a-Missionary assignments which mirrors what we have been promoting already here in Madison: Lutheran Church of Central Africa (Malawi) and Hmong Ministry in Kansas City. Also we heard reports from the officers to update us on our financial support of missions and how successful the Kids care. has been: Mission Box income in Fall 2010 was 2462.04 and in Spring 2011 was 2115.99 which were donated to the LWMS Central Office and the WELS Humanitarian Aid in its entirety. The kids will collect mission money this year for Partners in Apache Learning for tuition assistance to Lutheran schools on the Apache reservations in Arizona as well as updating deteriorating playground equipment.

After the break, I started my discussion of how the WELS produces local language Christian literature to reinforce the faith of new Christians and trains them to be spiritual leaders for their own people. I wove my husband and my story of work in Bulgaria. We were leading the translation effort while meeting people who by God's direction came into our lives. Not knowing how long we would remain we worked as we could to prepare them. I was able to produce Bulgarian language versions of 200-plus public domain Christian songs and liturgies. It was a process that seemed like "inspired translation" once a few Bulgarian women and I learned how to do it. Each song was studied from the perspective of the text, the Bible source, and the rhythm of the song. Most eventually were in rhyme and acceptable Bulgarian grammar as well. After seven years, it was used in worship services around the country. The rally audience appreciated the personal perspective on this type of mission work. We prayed publicly for it and those still doing it.

The rally theme was reinforced at lunch with the stones decorated with Christian messages. Each table held photo trees that showed people in missions as highlighted at one of the rallies. We had casseroles and desserts that were based on the recipes actually served at the


first Southern Hills rally. We had a chance to meet new people because we sat at numbered tables. I enjoyed speaking to a woman who grew up on the Apache reservation and went to a Lutheran school. We shared many personal stories about how God has worked in our lives in rather amazing situations.

After lunch we had more presentations on the work done in Malawi and the WELS C.A.&R. (Christian Aid & Relief) program. Both of these have been reinforced to our Lamb of God congregation through our local efforts. When we had our African potluck and educational videos and programs we learned what is happening in our fellow Christians' lives there. We were received the benefit of WELS CA&R when we had the trailer here with the supplies needed to do Alabama tornado relief work this spring and summer.

An overview of the 30-year history highlighted how God has worked in our midst to keep us mission-focused. Our church's role in the past included **First Rally Host**: Redeemer Lutheran Church (the predecessor to our Lamb of God site in Madison). One of the members from Redeemer at that time received the **Stick Your Neck Out award** for being the first circuit vice-president--Sharon Ball. The cook-books created include the historical highlights as well as recipes submitted by current women participants in our circuit's churches, such as Joni Gruber.

Let's stay involved through our prayers, offerings and gatherings for missions! Make an offering to support God's work done through us abroad and in the U.S.

Building & Grounds - Maintenance by Tom Poehlman


October Workday Re-cap

Church Yard Future Plans


